Rabbi's Message

March 2016--Adar I, Adar II, 5776

In times of tragedy, Jewish leaders would declare a day of prayer and fasting to invoke divine intervention. On the thirteenth of Adar, the Viceroy, Haman, concluded his preparation to begin the slaughter of the Persian Jewish community. In a remarkable turn of events, aided by the newly remorseful King Ahasuerus, the Jews would wage a war defeating their attackers the next day. This epic battle, to be known throughout history as Purim, would begin on the 14th of Adar. Remembering our brave ancestors led by Esther and Mordecai, Jews throughout the world will fast on the Fast of Esther. Being a leap year in 5776, Purim will be celebrated in Adar II.

Purim commemorates the military victory of the Persian Jews over an anti-Semitic ruler. During the seventy-one year period between the destruction of the First Temple (586 BCE) and resurrection of the Second (515 BCE), the exiled Jewish community lived freely under the Persian King Ahasuerus until he elevated the Amalekite Haman to the position of Viceroy (prime minister) over the entire Persian Empire stretching from India to Ethiopia. Haman, with the consent of the King, was given permission to kill ALL Jewish men, women and children. By the casting

of lots ("purim" in Farsi), the 14th of Adar was chosen as the date to fulfill this evil decree. Familiar with Jewish history, Haman deduced that this would be the perfect month to carry out his plan because Moses died during Adar. He forgot that Moses, the savior of the Jewish nation, was also born during Adar.

Through a series of miracles, G-d began preparing for Haman's downfall. Ahasuerus killed his first wife Vashti for refusing to dance naked before a party of visiting dignitaries. Invited were honored guests from all 127 provinces including Israel. (One midrash describes how the Jewish representatives were so ignorant of Jewish customs that they did not even know they were eating off dishes stolen from the destroyed First Temple.) Subsequently, the King married the beauty, Esther. At the time, he did not know that she was Jewish. The Jewish leader, Mordecai, a

relative of Esther, saved the King from a plot to poison him by the royal guards, Bigdan and Teresh. Earlier, Ahasuerus had wrongly suspected that Haman was behind the assassination attempt. Only at the culmination of three private parties, attended only by King Ahasuerus, Queen Esther and Haman, would the Queen reveal her Jewish identity. She expressed the fear that Haman would kill her and her people, the Jewish nation. Begging for mercy, the coward Haman was condemned to death. Not only was the Jewish community saved, but Haman and his ten sons were killed on the gallows that the ex-Viceroy had prepared for Mordecai. The Jews were given weapons to defeat their attackers. Not one Israelite was killed.

At the request of Esther and Mordecai, the Sages ruled that each year the story of their victory would be celebrated by Jews for all time. The reading of Megillat Esther (the Story of Esther) would be heard by every man, woman and child on both the night of Purim and the following morning. During the reading, the name of the evil Haman would be blotted out by noisemakers called graggers or ra'ashanim. Gifts would be distributed to the poor (matanot la'evyonim) and gifts of food to friends (mishloach manot). A festive Purim meal would be held on the day of Purim. Costumes are worn by children of all ages. This is the only holiday where the Rabbis permitted celebrants to drink more than usual so they would not know the "difference between cursed be Haman and blessed be Mordecai."

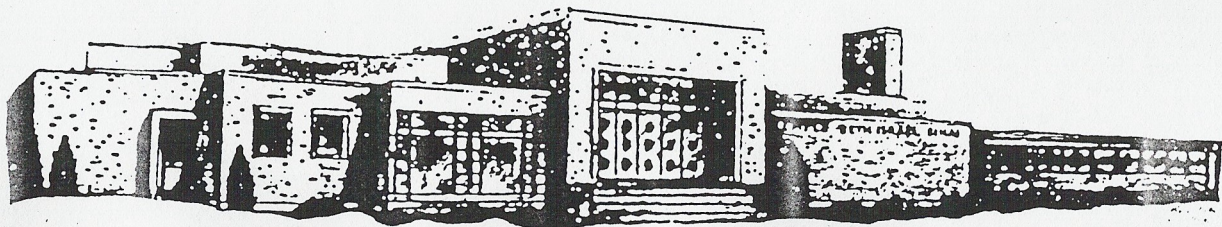
