Rabbi's Message

On Sunday, February 24th at 10:00 AM, Beth Israel Sinai Congregation will celebrate Purim with the reading of Megillat Esther. "Once there was a wicked, wicked man and Haman was his name, sir. He would have murdered all the Jews, but they were not to blame, sir. Oh, today will merry, merry be. Oh, today will merry, merry be. Oh, today will merry, merry be AND nosh some HAMENTASCHEN." These lyrics encapsulate the historical Jewish experience. After persecution comes our prayers to G-d and then we eat. Esther, the niece (some commentators say cousin) of the Jewish merchant and communal leader Mordechai, wins the love of the Persian king Ahasuerus during a royal beauty contest. From her royal throne, Esther (also known as Hadassah) witnesses the rise to power of the evil Haman. A descendent of the Amalikite nation, Haman's ancestors tried to prevent the Israelite conquest of Canaan. As prime minister, Haman sought to consolidate his control over the vast Persian Empire. In exchange for a large sum of money,

King Ahasuerus gave Haman permission to rule his 137 provinces as he wished. This included a plan to annihilate one of the king's most loyal nations---THE JEWS. In fact, Jews were so assimilated that when they attended the royal banquet to celebrate the King's rise to power, the Jewish representatives didn't realize they were being served on utensils that had been stolen from the First Temple after its destruction 200 years earlier.

All the different nations, from India to Ethiopia (Ma-Hodu Ad Kush), bowed to Haman's dictates. Their submission was "rewarded" by the plunder of their national resources and subjugation of their peoples. Only Mordechai the Jew refused to bow down to Haman. Though not openly rebellious, Mordechai explained that Jews could not bow down to worship any mortal.

Angry at this insubordination, Haman plots the destruction of the Jews. The prime minister asked the King to grant his request to murder an entire nation. The pathological Haman even offered the Kina 10.000 gold talents for permission to kill all the Jews. Not wishing to be bothered with affairs of state, Ahasuerus readily grants Haman's request and tells him to keep his money. The 14th day of the Jewish month of Adar was established as the date the Holocaust would begin. Other provinces notified their (continued on page 2)

citizenry to turn against their Jewish neighbors. The kingdom would provide them with weapons to kill the Jews. The Jews were forbidden from defending themselves.

Word reaches Esther of Haman's plot to annihilate her people. Since Ahasuerus was unaware of her Jewish origins and passionately loved his Queen, Esther's safety was virtually guaranteed. A reluctant heroine, Esther was persuaded by her uncle to use her position to save her people. Esther fasts and prays to G-d for a solution to her dilemma.

Esther decides to hold a series of private banquets to be attended by only three people---the King, the Queen and Haman. She hoped the King's professed love for her would enable her to succeed. Esther had to approach Ahasuerus cautiously, for if the King failed to hold out his royal

ring as a supplicant entered, that individual would die. As Esther approached, the King held out his ring and Ahasuerus said: "What can I do for you my Queen? Any request shall be yours--up to half of my kingdom." Esther invites the King and Haman to dine with her over a series of three banquets. Astounded by the simplicity and generosity of this request, Ahasuerus eagerly accepts her invitation. A messenger is sent to inform Haman that his presence is requested.

So as not to arouse Haman's suspicions, the first two banquets are attended with little fanfare. It is at the third banquet where Esther asks the King: "If it pleases Your Majesty, it is with a heavy heart that I must make a special request. There is a powerful man in this kingdom who wishes to kill me and my people." Ahasuerus immediately demands to know who would dare threaten to harm his beloved Queen? Esther points to the wicked Haman. Without a moment's delay, the King orders the arrest of Haman and his

ten sons. Later, they would be hung on the gallows built by Haman for Mordechai and other Jewish leaders. Notification was sent to the 137 leaders of of Persia's different nationalities to supply their Jewish subjects with weapons to defend themselves against their neighbor's attacks. Not one Jew lost their lives. Casualties were limited to acts of self defense.

Purim: a Synopsis


Purim, one of the most joyous holidays in the Jewish calendar celebrates the deliverance of the Jewish people in exile in Persia. The story is told in the Book of Esther, which is read as part of the holiday, remembering how a young Jewish girl became queen of Persia and risked the anger of her new husband to get him to prevent an

attack on all Jews living in Persia, men, women, and children. The story, also called the Megillah, tells of the fall of the king's feared adviser, who perishes out of his own malice, the bravery of a young woman, and the perseverance of the Jewish people. The festival is celebrated with gifts of food and drink, feasting, and games, especially dressing in costumes to remember how Esther was chosen as most beautiful in the kingdom.
