Rabbi's Message

As I complete my 15th year at Beth Israel Sinai, I can honestly say that I have never been prouder to be part of such a beautiful religious institution. Despite attempts to eliminate it as the only force for nondenominational Judaism in Wisconsin, we have grown even stronger. The temple board, under the dynamic leadership of President Shelly Vielie, has worked closely with me to ensure our success. This year we had our first annual Pre-Yom Kippur concert and dinner. With minimal advertising, this event was attended by 40 members and guests. The North Shore Music Institute entertained us for over two hours with moving compositions of Hebrew, Yiddish and classical music, and a little Leonard Cohen added for good measure. The dinner ended with a moving rendition of Kol Nidre. Three new members joined our temple. Services were also attended by people who were visiting Beth Israel Sinai for the first time. Record numbers of individuals attended all High Holiday services. Future

events, including a wine tasting party and a Las Vegas night, are being planned for the remainder of the current year. All members of our temple family are encouraged to bring guests and potential new members to our synagogue. Shabbat services are conducted every Saturday morning at 9:45am. A kabbalat Shabbat service and dinner is held on the third Friday evening of each month at 6:00pm. Adult education classes, individual tutoring leading to conversion, classes for children ages 6-12 and Bar and Bat Mitzvah training are held each Thursday. Tell your friends that we emphasize what all Jews have in common and not their sectarian differences. There are no ORTHODOX, CONSERVATIVE or REFORM Jews at Beth Israel Sinai. All opinions are respected and encouraged. Unaffiliated Jews, interfaith families and individuals are welcome to experience the warmth of our temple family.

Our celebration of Sukkot unofficially began the morning of Sunday, Sep-

tember 27th as congregants gathered to build our sukkah. The sukkah symbolizes the fragility of life and how dependent we are on G-d for our existence. Those four walls, first built by our ancestors while crossing the Sinai Desert, show that individuals can exist in even the most humble of dwellings. It is customary to eat, sleep and recite the blessings over the lulav and esrog in the sukkah, weather permitting, to enable us to experience nature more intimately. The roof is constructed with leaves and branches (schach), enabling those sleeping in the sukkah to gaze upon the stars. What a beautiful way to contemplate G-d's creation. Later that evening, at 5pm, our temple family attended services, followed by a deli dinner.

Yizkor services will be recited on Shemini Atzeret (Eighth Assembly) on Monday, October 5th at 9:45am. The first Shemini Atzeret was inaugurated by King Solomon after the completion of the First Temple. Sol-

omon was so proud of his achievement that he invited all citizens of Israel to celebrate Sukkot with him. Sorry to see the celebration end, King Solomon decreed that the party should continue for another day. The Torah was read in public. That's why in Israel both Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah are celebrated on the same day. This custom continues in Israel even today. Beth Israel Sinai will celebrate Simchat Torah at services on Monday, October 5th at 7pm.
