Rabbi's Message

It is hard to believe that I have officiated at Beth Israel Sinai for almost fifteen years. So much has happened that it would be impossible to enumerate each event in a single article. Originally, I agreed to come for ten months until the congregation found a full time rabbi. None was found. Three years after my arrival, our president, Audrey Bernstein, and another member asked me if I would consider studying for my ordination. An article in the national Jewish magazine, MOMENT, described how a seminary in New York offered a correspondence course leading to simcha. Candidates for this program were required to have had previous yeshiva training. The temple graciously offered to pay for the three year program. Though hesitant at first due to a very busy schedule as the spiritual leader of Beth Israel Sinai, the Northbrook Brookdale Seasons senior citizens home and an independent agent with Electronic Merchant Systems, I accepted the challenge. After all, sleep is overrated. I completed my selfimposed deadline. On September 30th, the congregation honored me with a special Shabbat service celebrating my ordination. It was the last simcha attended by my father, Myron. Dad passed

away two months later. As I look back over our fifteen years together, despite skeptics who predicted our demise, we have continued as a vibrant NONDENOMINA-**TIONAL** congregation. Our commitment to maintaining a strong traditional Jewish presence in southeast Wisconsin has never been stronger. Shabbat and holiday services have almost always had the necessary quorum. Our monthly Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service and dinner often had 15-20 participants. Our adult education classes were regularly attended each Thursday evening. Max Gordon organized our first weekday morning minyan. Two students are currently studying towards conversion. While we recently lost four of our most beloved congregants over the last year, Victor Ganz, Norman Levin, Ruth Hulbert, Lucille Bloom and Patti Kushner, we simultaneously acquired five new members. Joyce and Bob Katzman, Sarah and Perry Kivolowitz, Judy and Stan Rosen, Judy and Joe Roher and Barry Langleib became the newest members of our temple family. On June 1st, our new temple board, to be led by our incoming president, Shelly Vielie, has already made exciting and innovative suggestions designed to ensure the growth of our congregation. Special thanks to the outgoing board for its work

on behalf of Beth Israel Sinai.

We still have much work to do. To guarantee our growth as the traditional Jewish epicenter in southeastern Wisconsin, every member should consider him/ herself an "ambassador" representing Beth Israel Sinai. Encourage local Jewish families and all Jews in southeastern Wisconsin and northern Illinois to visit our exciting and vibrant temple. Make known to everyone that our historic synagogue is available as a venue for ALL life cycle events. Inform them that we are an egalitarian, traditional shul with a strictly kosher kitchen welcoming ALL different Jewish points of view. Interfaith families are welcomed. We INTENTION-ALLY do not label ourselves "orthodox", "conservative" or "reform". Beth Israel Sinai seeks to bring ALL Jews together, emphasizing what unites our historical people rather than sectarian divisions.

As we begin to write a new chapter for our century old congregation, may we continue to grow from strength to strength. "CHAZAK, CHAZAK, V'NITCHAZEK."

Modern services are based on the services in the second temple. Those services began with the borchu and ended with the priestly blessing. In between, the cohanim (priests) read the sha'ma and performed the sacrifices. Today, the Amidah replaces the sacrifices, and prayers have been added before the borchu as well as after the priestly blessing.
