



Rabbi's Message

Did you ever notice how many different types of Haggadot exist? There are the traditional Haggadot that tell the entire story of the exodus from Egypt. They ask the readers to imagine that they too were being redeemed from Egypt. "With a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, the Lord your G-d took you from slavery to freedom." Both children and adults are asked to describe what it feels like to them to be redeemed. It is the only holiday where the Rabbis encourage children to take the lead. As the youngest child recites the Four Questions, we

as Jewish adults are required to provide answers. "We were servants to Pharoah in Egypt..." All children, be they wise, simple, wicked or unable to even formulate a question participate in this discussion. Indeed, these four children represent all facets of Jewish people throughout history. Parents must candidly inform their children that their ancestors were once idol worshippers. Terach, the father of our Patriarch Abraham, was an idol manufacturer. Abraham revolted when he realized that there could be only one true G-d. As a reward, Abraham was promised by the Holy One that his ancestors would inherit the land of Israel for eternity. Bur first, G-d promised: "Know with certainty that your offspring will be aliens in a land not their own, where they will serve those who oppress them for four hundred years. Also upon the nations which they will serve will I execute judgment, and afterwards they will (see page 3)

NOTES FROM THE TREASURER

We Jews are admired for our generous gifts to charity. Charity begins at home and what charity is closer to home than our own synagogue. DID YOU KNOW?

Racine's first shul was B'nai Yehuda Anshe Sholom. One Shabbat a young bride refused to sit behind the mechitza declaring, "If I can't sit with my husband, I will start my own shul!" Temple Sinai was Reform and attracted Jews born in America who wanted a service they could understand. Later, a Conservative congregation formed, Beth Israel, and hired Racine's first Rabbi. Rabbi Cohen encouraged a merger of Sinai and Beth Israel. The last liturgical hurdle was whether or not to allow a piano to be played during services. Rabbi Cohen suggested that the piano be played in the foyer and heard in the sanctuary. The two congregations became Beth Israel Sinai. Many years later Beth Yehuda closed. Its members were accommodated at Beth Israel Sinai by conducting the early part of services using the Orthodox ritual.

leave with great possessions."

Ten plagues reigned upon Pharoah and his ministers who refused to let our people go. The most severe plague was the death of the first born of every living creature. This was in retribution for Pharoah's earlier edict to murder all the first born Jewish males. Had G-d only rescued us and given us the Promised Land--DAYENU. This would certainly have been enough. Despite the persecution that has followed the Jewish people throughout history, G-d has not only guaranteed our survival but insured our prosperity under even the most adverse conditions. Our worst suffering has occurred when we have deviated from our Holy mission to be a "Light to the Nations."

It should be noted that our Passover story represents ONLY our physical freedom from persecution. Despite G-d's bequeathing to us of our Torah, a blueprint for life, we have often rejected its profound instruction. Many of the former Hebrew slaves feared that Moses would never return from his Divine encounter at the summit of Mt. Sinai. In place of their leader, a Golden Calf was built. As punishment for this perverse act, G-d decreed that the freed slaves would never enter the Promised Land. Only their great grandchildren, who had not experienced slavery, would be allowed to enter.

What about those other versions of the Haggadot mentioned earlier? Whether they are Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist, Humanistic, Feminist, or LGBT, they all focus on the same theme of freedom. According to many recent polls, more Jews identify with Passover than any other Jewish holiday. Freedom is a concept that we all cherish. Freedom is a notion, not only for ourselves but for people universally, that must always be protected.
