Rabbi's Message

JUNE 2016---IYAR, SIVAN 2016

As we begin the last week of the counting of the Omer, on June 4th Beth Israel Sinai will be celebrating its 100th anniversary.

Ten years ago I received my ordination from a private yeshiva in New York. In October of 2000, I became your spiritual leader. So much has happened over the last decade and a half that it would be impossible to enumerate in a single article. The last thing I ever anticipated was becoming a congregational Rabbi.

The only time I previously contemplated this was in the spring of 1973. My application to the Jewish Theological Seminary was pending. All prospective students were asked to fly to New York for an interview. After

meeting with the seminary

committee, I decided that we would not be a good fit. As an overly idealistic student and newlywed, I was uncertain if I could tolerate the politics of the pulpit. Also, it seemed at the time to be the goal of most congregational leaders to move every few years to bigger and better congregations. Witnessing what had happened to my own rabbi and mentor, who became the Rabbi at BIS following his departure from my hometown of Benton Harbor, Michigan, I did not wish to similarly uproot my future family from one place to another.

Still, I regretted being unable to share my knowledge with a wider number of students. To fulfill this desire, over the years, I had served as a self-trained cantor and teacher in a number of synagogues and schools in Michigan, Florida, South Africa (where I did my doctoral research) and Illinois.

In 1997, an ad in the Chicago Jewish Star said that Beth Israel Sinai in Racine was looking for a new rabbi. After meeting with the board, despite not having my ordination, I was considered for the position. However, my predecessor, Rabbi Zev Harari, decided to remain for another three years.

After Rabbi Harari agreed to assume a position in a newly formed Reconstructionist congregation in Minneapolis, I was called to assume the honor and responsibility of navigating an increasingly older congregation whose younger members were moving to larger metropolitan areas. Who would have guessed in October of 2000 that I would become the longest-serving leader of Beth Israel Sinai? According to historical records, the previous longest-serving leader, Rabbi Hyman Cohen, served from 1956 to 1969. Rabbi Cohen was the only rabbi to buried to the Racine Jewish Memorial Park. His successor was my rabbi, teacher and friend, Rabbi Irving Dick.

Still hesitant to make a long term commitment, the board and I agreed that, subject to review, I would lead Beth Israel Sinai for ten months until the congregation found a full-time rabbi. After several unsuccessful interviews, no one was found.

In June of 2003, the president of the synagogue, Audrey Bernstein, and another congregant, Mimi Miller, asked me if I would consider studying for my ordination. An article in a national Jewish magazine, MOMENT, described how a yeshiva in New York offered a correspondence course leading to smicha. Candidates for this program were required to have had previous yeshiva training. The temple graciously offered to pay for the three year program. (continued on page 2)

Though initially reluctant due to a busy schedule at Beth Israel Sinai, the Brookdale Seasons senior citizen home in Northbrook. IL and running an independent agency for Electronic Merchant Systems, I accepted the challenge. After all, SLEEP IS OVERATED! In June of 2006, I completed my self-imposed deadline and was ordained as a Rabbi. On September 30th, the congregation honored me with a special Shabbat service celebrating my ordination. It was the last festive occasion attended by my late father, Myron. Dad passed away three months later on the 23rd of Kislev---two days before Chanukah. My mother, Elaine, who vigorously supported my wish to study in depth what it meant to be a Jew, passed away 23 years earlier while my family and I were living in Johannesburg, South Africa.

As I look back over the last sixteen years, despite skeptics who annually predicted our demise, we have continued as a vibrant, albeit smaller, post-denominational congregation. Desiring to maintain our unique identity as a temple stressing what all Jews have in common and not our sectarian differences, attempts to merge with other congregations have been roundly defeated.

Our commitment to maintaining a strong and vibrant Jewish presence in south-eastern Wisconsin has never been greater. Our pre-Yom Kippur dinner and concert attracted 50 participants. Weekly Shabbat and Holiday morning services are attended by both members and visitors to the area. Our monthly Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service and dinner drew 15 -20 participants. Our Thursday night Torah classes have also proven to be a big hit. Two successful communal seders were conducted.

After another futile attempt to disband our congregation in June of 2014, for the last year we have been led by Shelly Vielie. Our president and the Temple board made many exciting new suggestions designed to ensure the growth of our Temple. Shelly's continued leadership in 2016-2017 will build upon the successes of this past year. Special thanks to Shelly and the outgoing board for its work on behalf of Beth Israel Sinai.
