From our Rabbi

Thanksgiving is the holiday when most Americans gather together with family and friends to say "thank you." For us as Jews we say "thank you" to G-d in numerous ways every day. From the time we wake up when we say "Modeh Ani Lefanechah" (thanking G-d for permitting us to experience another day), to blessings over the food to the time we go to bed at night, we thank Adonai.


President George Washington proclaimed Thursday, November 26, 1789, a day of national Thanksgiving to G-d for "His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to

their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty

with which we have been blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us."

The Jewish communities in the United States rejoiced in the part they played in establishing this new country. Both Jewish money and blood were given to the American fight for freedom. Un-

like any other country in the world, Jews were treated as citizens EQUAL to their non-Jewish neighbors. In 1784, five years before Washington's proclamation, leaders of Congregation Shearith Israel in New York City (established in 1654) sent a letter to Governor George Clinton of New York on behalf of "the ancient congregation of Israelites." In this correspondence they said: "Though



Jews have historically observed as patriotic Americans the holiday of Thanksgiving. At Shearith Israel in New York, the Rev. Gershom Mendes Seixas arranged a prayer service suitable for the holiday. In his address to the congregation, Rev. Seixas called upon Jews "to support that government which is founded upon the strictest principles of equal liberty and justice." (see page 2)

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(from page 1) In later years, Thanksgiving was celebrated at Shearith Israel and other early American congregations. These days were proclaimed in the name of the American people to be observed by each citizen according to his or her own faith. In 1817, the state of New York proclaimed a national observance of Thanksgiving Day. Shearith Israel held services in each of the subsequent years except 1849 and 1854. In those years, the Governor of the state addressed his proclamation specifically to a "Christian people" instead of to Americans of all faiths.

Even the most Orthodox Jews have advocated the celebration of Thanksgiving. Two of the greatest Jewish legal minds of the twentieth century, Rabbi Moshe Feinstein and Rabbi Joseph Soloveichek, advocated the celebration of Thanksgiving as a "secular" or "national" holiday. (Non-Jewish holidays with a specifically religious overtone are not to be celebrated--like Christmas.) This national holiday belongs to ALL Americans. It is only fitting that Jews and Gentiles thank G-d for all the blessings the Almighty has bestowed upon this nation. Jews, in particular, have many reasons to thank Adonai for the freedoms and opportunities granted to us in the United States.

In his famous letter to the Jewish community of Newport in 1790, President Washington wrote: "May the children of Abraham who dwell in this land continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other inhabitants--while everyone shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree and there shall be none to make him afraid."
