## **From our Rabbi**

I have never been prouder to be your Rabbi. It's hard to believe that last October, I began my 20th year serving Beth Israel Sinai. Max Gordon and Dr. Michael Ganz, of Blessed Memory, were the co-presidents of the synagogue. After three interviews, we agreed that I would serve as the interim spiritual leader for 10 months allowing them time to find a full time ordained rabbi. At that time, though having considerable Jewish knowledge from studying several years in Yeshiva and in Israel, many members desired an ordained leader. Unable to achieve their goal, my contract was extended twice for periods of one and two years respectively. In 2003, our Temple President found an article in Moment Magazine where a Yeshiva in New York, offered long distance study programs. The Board of BIS offered to pay my tuition. Thank G-d sleep is overrated. Besides my two days serving Beth Israel Sinai, I was employed as Cantor in a Brookdale senior citizens home in Northbrook and at Electronic Merchant System a credit card processing company. (When I first joined BIS in 2000, I was a partner in an educational products company specializing in math and language learning programs.) I would often prop a volume of Talmud on the bars of my treadmill while working out four to five miles a day. In June 2006, I became ordained as Rabbi. A special service was held on Shabbat Teshuvah, the Sabbath of Repentance that fell between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur that September. My Dad Myron, Marcia, my children, family members and most of our congregants attended. My Dad passed away three months later. Several failed attempts were made between 2001-2015 to merge with Temple Beth Hillel. Their Rabbi and I have maintained a very cordial relations and presided together at congregational joint activities. Talk began about the need to move to smaller premises. While the building was paid for, it was becoming increasingly impossible to afford the maintenance of the building. After the last unsuccessful attempt to merge with Temple Beth Hillel, it was decided that to SURVIVE, our beloved temple had to be sold. Some lifelong members deeply attached to our synagogue, nicknamed "Hamptons of the Midwest" by one of my children because of its easy access Lake Michigan, could not accept that to financially survive, we had to downsize. To make a long story short, the building was eventually sold. A small store was purchased. Despite the departure of many disgruntled individuals, BETH ISRAEL SINAI, unlike many churches and synagogues lacking members and adequate financial resources, has proudly survived.

Today we are a financially stable congregation of 25 members. Note, I said STABLE—not wealthy. This is possible because of the volunteer participation of all our members. To name a few, our president, Joyce Placzkowski, handles all our secretarial work and is responsible for the publication of our monthly bulletin, with my participation, Jim Barten does all the heavy lifting and construction. Just to name a couple of many achievements, Jim is responsible for putting up the Yahrzeit plaques and Tree of Life. Shelly Vielie our Vice-president who made the transition to the new building smooth. Marion Sperer, our recording secretary helps to maintain the cleanliness of the Temple. One of our newest members David Lee, serves as our Temple treasurer. Rebekah Jones, who recently moved to Racine from Georgia, serves on our Temple board. Without the help of these individuals, my job would be impossible.

I would be remiss not to thank the 150 individuals, largely through the publicity of the Racine Interfaith Council, who attended Rosh Hashanah services after the desecration of our Temple on September 21st. Special thanks to Mayor Corey Mason, who to show his opposition to such acts of hateful vandalism, not only attended both Rosh Hashanah (accompanied by his entire family) and Yom Kippur services, but sent city engineers to power wash the hated symbols off our brick sidewall. Former Mayor John Dickert and Father Bill Dietzler spoke eloquently during service, My colleague and friend of almost 20 years, Rabbi Dena Feingold of Temple Beth Hillel, who worshipped with many of her congregants with us on the Second Day of Rosh Hashanah. And last but not least, the Good Samaritans who asked to remain anonymous after scraping the graffiti off our glass windows less than 24 hours after its occurrence.

Two weeks ago, I received news from the Camden New Jersey District Attorney's office that the instigator of not only the desecration of Beth Israel Sinai, but also Temple Jacob in Hancock, Michigan the day before. To quote Tobin, "TO TAG THE SH—T OUT OF THEM." Fortunately, his followers limited their activities to the building itself. What was called by Tobin "Operation Kristallnacht," named after the 1938 event in Germany which many historians credit as the beginning of the Holocaust, could have been much worse. The actual perpetrators have yet to be arrested.

To insure the growth of Congregation Beth Israel as a spiritual center for TRADITIONAL-EGALITARIAN Judaism in southeastern Wisconsin and Northern Illinois, we have embarked on a major advertising campaign. With the voluntary help of Community Connect, a company owned by my daughter Becky, we have a presence on social media.
