The story of Joseph portrays how one clever individual saved the Egyptian nation and the entire Middle East from starvation by storing grain during the seven years of prosperity. It is a story of how even a man sold into slavery could rise to become a head of state. Estranged from his brothers, it was the famine that would reunite them. Jacob's sons came to Egypt in search of food. Joseph's brothers did not suspect that the Egyptian ruler was their brother. They thought that he had been killed by wild animals after they threw him down an abandoned pit. They did not know that a band of Ishmaelites had removed Joseph from the pit and sold him into slavery. However, Joseph recognized them and decides to see if they had become better human beings. Joseph wines and dines his brothers. After securing food for their return trip to Israel, Joseph places a silver goblet in Benjamin's backpack to make it appear as if he had stolen it. Would his brothers abandon Benjamin as they had earlier abandoned Joseph? After they depart, soldiers follow them and discover the goblet. Joseph orders Benjamin detained.

Judah has become totally devoid of his earlier jealousy of Joseph that had filled his heart and the hearts of his brothers. Judah tries every technique possible to arouse in Joseph some semblance of compassion due to the special love of Jacob for Benjamin. First he asks Joseph whether he had ever experienced the love of a brother or father. Not receiving any immediate response, Judah offers to trade places with Benjamin and become Joseph's slave. Judah cannot bear the thought of what would happen to Jacob should Benjamin become enslaved. Judah's appeal to Joseph's sense of compassion eventually worked. Joseph totally loses control of his emotions. Not wanting to appear undignified before Pharoah's courtiers, he orders all of the soldiers out of the room. After revealing his true identity, Joseph embraces and kisses Benjamin and his brothers. Joseph's sobs of joy were so loud after revealing his true identity to his brothers, that news reached the Egyptian ruler of what had happened. Pharaoh confirms what had happened with Joseph. In appreciation for Joseph's service in preventing the nation from descending into starvation, Pharaoh orders that Joseph's entire family come and live in Egypt. It is in Egypt that the tribes of Jacob will evolve into a united Hebrew nation.

Now that Chanukah is over and the secular New Year has begun, we must renew our commitment to guaranteeing our Jewish house of worship in Racine. A strong spiritual and personal bond has developed between my family and the congregation over the last 20 years. We continue to grow closer as a community. "Chazak, chazak, v'nitchazak." May we all grow from strength to strength.
