With the end of Ne'ilah, it is my hope that we have all been SEALED in the BOOK OF LIFE. In the Age of Covid, the Mahzor passage asking "who shall live and who shall die" becomes relevant. To quote from Mahzor On Rosh Hashanah it is written, and on Yom Kippur it is sealed. How many shall leave this world, and how many shall be born? Who shall live and who shall die? Who in the fullness of years and who before? Who shall perish by fire and who by water? Who by sword and who by wild beast? Who by famine and who by thirst? Who by earthquake and who by plague? Who by strangling and who by stoning? Who shall rest and who will be disturbed? Who shall be at peace and who afflicted? Who shall be impoverished and who enriched? Who shall be humbled and who exalted? And the remedy to insure human survival and avert both individually and collectively a "divine death sentence" is REPENTANCE, PRAYER AND DEEDS OF LOVING KINDNESS.

Or as the song says "put a little love in your heart". With the United States approaching 200,000 deaths for Covid-19, we all must do more to ensure our collective survival. Instead of the secular dates of each month's yahrzeits, we will publish on this page a sketch of one or more persons who's yahrzeits fall during the month. Beth Israel Sinai does not keep biographical records. If you know anything about persons on the yahrzeit list, please share. The more we know, the more likely we are to publish.

ISABEL TANNENBAUM July 10, 1912—November 3, 2008

Isabel is best remembered for the bagels, challah, and rye bread she baked at Supreme Bakery, 1242 State Street. Supreme was the of three Jewish bakeries in Racine. Another was Northwestern Bakery two doors west owned by Sam Tabaksman, and the third, owned by a Levin family, was on a nearby cross street, possibly Union Street.

Isabel's parents, David and Fannie Alperovitz, brought their recipes from Russia to Sheboygan early in the 20th century. In 1921, State Street Bakery was listed for sale. It featured a brick oven, one of the secrets to good bakery. David and Fannie bought it and moved to Racine. Isabel was 9 years old.

Supreme Bakery offered a complete line of baked goods, including bagels, Jewish rye and challah, as well as home delivery. The family drove the bakery's three trucks as well as doing the baking. In an era when few folks had heard the word "bagel", the family baked 100 dozen every Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday. The customers lined up.

Isabel married Max Tannenbaum in 1939. They ran the business from 1941 until it closed in 1971. At the end. Supreme was open only a few days a week.

Upon learning of Isabel's retirement, our Rabbi told her, "Isabel, no one else knows how to make your bread. You should teach the ladies of the Sisterhood!" she replied. Three weeks later our anonymous source received a call from Isabel, "I am going to teach you to bake rye bread. I'll tell you who you can invite to help. Only those can come. I'm not doing this because I like you. I don't! But, I like your husband." Each week when the anonymous husband bought bread, he visited Max, who was quite disabled, and whose job was watching the oven to make sure nothing burned. Isabell was grateful. Eventually, she even accepted some of the women she had bared from the group.

Sisterhood held bake sales. They baked 180 loaves of rye and sold out by 10:30 am. Only a fourth of the customers were Jewish. One clerk in the traffic department of Massey Ferguson, a chubby Polish fellow, bought 5 loaves at every sale. He must have eaten rye bread for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

Our anonymous source regularly visited Isabel in the nursing home. "I think she grudgingly decided I might be sort of okay. But maybe not. Anyway, I got a great kick out of her and bless the days she taught me, and thus my whole family, to bake bread–rye, challah, and bagel. You should see the challahs my sons produce braided with four to six strands of dough. For me it has been a skill that has opened doors and started friendships all through my life."

Twenty-five years after Supreme closed, "The Bagel Lady" filled the front page of the Journal Times food section. The reporter expressed pity for those who never tasted, "the best bagel in the whole world." Isabel's bagels were irregularly shaped, rough textured, chewy as a rubber tire, and delicious. "I don't make no little bagels." Isabel declared.
